

# NEWS FLASH TASKFORCE 2023



## INTRODUCTION

The first news flash of the Kingdom Taskforce on Children's Rights for 2023 shares vital information on after-school activities, parenting support, youth participation and much more. We have seen meaningful developments on all islands regarding compliance to child rights laws. The islands work separately but also together. # ARUBA

In Aruba, significant work has been done in several key areas in the past year. These include the 'Positive Parenting' program, which was started by the Youth and Family Center in 2016 and encompasses approximately 20 organizations that meet on a quarterly basis. The program recently established a committee that will work on creating a Parenting Vision. [A Parenting Vision expresses what children need in their upbringing to grow up safely and healthily and to develop into adult citizens who fully participate in society.]

The Center conducts workshops and lectures for parents, and in conjunction with Children's Phone, has started a project to give additional support to fathers to help them become more involved in their families. As part of these efforts, it is also working with hotels to ensure that employees are given time off to attend the skill building activities. Later this year, the range of activities offered by the Youth and Family Center will be listed in a catalog intended for schools and the Ministry of Education.

Work has also been done to establish programs about Healthy and Safe Parenting, Signs of Safety and to implement the Protection Code in Aruba. The government has implemented a pilot project for safety nets in after-school care programs and at a foundation and intends on extending this initiative in the coming months.

Additionally, the Parenting Vision committee is working closely with various civil society organizations in schools. In 2022, this work included the creation of a 4-year strategic plan for parenting support and other areas of importance to families. The Turning Empathy: Strategic Plan to Improve Emotionally Healthy Parenting through an Outreach Approach 2022-2026, has been finalized and its implementation commenced in early 2023.

Aruba is also in talks with UNICEF to access further support for its positive parenting and youth participation programs. As Arubans celebrate the first five years of Parenting Week, they are focused on empowering local organizations as they plan and organize for a better future.

# BONAIRE

With funds from the Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations (BZK), the number of after-school activities on Bonaire has increased and several new projects have been initiated, including the construction of a hybrid classroom, which will also be used as a kitchen.

A webpage for young people is being developed and will provide up-to-date information on what is going on in Bonaire. The webpage will be added to the official government website and will also be a link to the so-called child pass.

This child pass, formally known as the "Diamond Pass", gives access to sporting, cultural, and educational activities. It can also function as a library and discount card. The pilot group that tested the pass gave positive reviews. After an awareness campaign, children will be able to order these online later this year, with parental consent. A recently hired coordinator will organize some of these activities for young people aged 13 and older.



An old community center is being converted into a Family Justice Center to centralize youth care activities. Victims of child abuse and domestic violence will go there for all the necessary help (police, doctors, etc.). The 'Aksesio' foundation will provide social support at the Center as well as the neighborhood development project. Aksesio is a 1-stop counter, where people can go with all kinds of questions about youth care. The Integral Youth Policy will be refined into an action plan which will provide more clarity on these developments.

Last year, an awareness campaign for child safety in traffic was held and was so well received by the population that the campaign will be repeated this year.

Bonaire is also placing major emphasis on youth participation. The Public Entity Bonaire and UNICEF have written an overview of the various organizations that are supporting youth on behalf of the government. UNICEF is also providing technical assistance and the Youth Council is being revived to better attune the activities of the chain partners to the needs of youth.



# CURAÇAO

A youth platform has been set up to connect young people from different sociocultural backgrounds. The youth platform currently has 5 members, and wants to expand to a maximum of 15 young people, so that more activities can be organized. This year's theme for the activities is 'inclusion'.

In collaboration with youth organizations from Romania and Albania, local organization Pro Bista has agreed to a project with Erasmus+ that offers blind and visually impaired youth a platform to promote inclusiveness. In October this year, young people from Romania and Albania will travel to Curaçao to learn about Curaçaoan youth and culture.

With support from UNICEF, the team in Curaçao is working hard to complete the Protection Code, which is being spearheaded by a national coordinator. The project was launched on the 25th of November 2022 and the Code's roadmap for Aruba will also be implemented in Curaçao. The Code's project leaders will make an inventory of all NGOs and GOs in their area, which will also be featured on the social map.

The chain partners are currently reviewing the Code and each chain partner will be assessed to ascertain whether a child safety protocol already exists within their organization. At the same time, it will also be determined who at the chain partners qualifies to participate in the 'train the trainers' training.

A proposal for youth legislation has been presented to the Minister of SOAW. The SOAW, together with the University of Curaçao, and Child Protection, is also working on the development of a toolkit for professionals, which will be online soon.



### Information Session Protection Code

The University of Curaçao is conducting various studies about the state of vulnerable children on the island. Curaçao is also working with UNICEF to achieve a baseline measurement of domestic violence and child abuse. New research on the rights of the child has now been completed and presented to the minister. Systems will also be set up this year to monitor developments and to support decision-making based on this data.

Curaçao has submitted a project via Erasmus+ to better study the problems of undocumented children and youths' lack of access to medical assistance because they do not have residence permits. This is a serious issue that will be studied and mapped out with a local partner this year.

Implementing the parenting vision is scheduled for 2023. An awareness campaign about parenting will start this year. The aim of this is to make 'parenting' an important topic of conversation among the population so that children can be guided more consciously.





# SABA

Child Focus organizes various after-school activities for children between 4 and 12 years old. All children on the island in that age range, including children who are not registered at Child Focus, can participate in these activities.

The high school organizes several after-school activities such as clubs and societies for young people aged 12-18. These clubs expose students to diverse disciplines and are supervised by adult coaches.



There are two 'healthy lifestyle' programs for children of varying ages. In these programs, children and parents attend workshops via which they receive insights on the risks of being overweight and advice on how to live healthily.

The Youth Council, which was quite active and worked independently, is now going through a transitional phase because of the absence of former members who migrated for their studies. The remaining members are being guided by two government employees as the Council works to recruit new members.

The Youth 13+ project was set up as part of the Positive Parenting program. This project aims to focus the joint efforts of the Caribbean Netherlands to support the development of youth into adulthood. Young people must be given the opportunity to make full use of their talents so that they can participate fully in society.

The themes of this project are:

- Housing
- Leisure and development activities
- Poverty reduction
- Youth participation
- Domestic violence and child abuse
- Education and labor

The government and civil society organizations are working to combat domestic violence and child abuse with guidance from the Administrative Agreement (Bestuursakkoord) and various actions plans. The working groups comprise members of the Safety Network whose programs protect children and youth.

Furthermore, work is currently being done on a crisis shelter (a flexible shelter) so that victims of domestic violence and child abuse will not have to leave Saba to access care.

Families and children can now access professional help and support after consulting with experts. All cases are discussed and can be tackled directly from a solid step-by-step plan which is implemented gradually based on the client's progress and needs.



# ST. EUSTATIUS

Some of the guidance provided to parents on St. Eustatius is done through the Triple P method which focuses on Positive Parenting. St. Eustatius wishes to expand this work by collaborating with St. Maarten and the University of the West Indies on positive parenting strategies.

Ongoing cooperation with the BES and Children's Telephone Foundation of Aruba has proved successful. Guana Chat, St. Eustatius' children's telephone, went live in March 2022. Many children have already called and a campaign within schools is currently being considered to provide children and youth with more information about the topics they can call about, how to share their concerns, and to assure them that their privacy will be respected. These are issues they have many questions about.

The roll-out of the legal guidance (juridische handreiking) has started. The Family Support Coordinator began their tenure on St. Eustatius and is collaborating with Desiree Frans (Bonaire) and Angela Dekker (St. Maarten, project manager Bes(t)4Kids). Staff of daycare centers, after-school programs, sports institutions, youth care, social support unit, etc., have received training.

Vulnerable children on the island are mapped in various ways and collaborative programs on healthy and safe child development are ongoing and are producing positive results. JOGG (Jongeren Op Gezond Gewicht) is involved in this and is working closely with the GGD.

The St. Eustatius team wants to collaborate with other islands to provide better support to students who leave the island to study.

Working visits were made to Bonaire, St. Maarten and Curaçao which revealed that students are ill-prepared and are faced with many, often insoluble, problems. In collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science, efforts are being made to see how students can be better prepared for their departure. In addition, research is being carried out into how young Statians abroad can regain their interest in returning to the island to support the aging population.

The Youth Committee, with support from the youth worker, organizes its own activities. A Christmas gala and a movie night will be held this year. The council needs new members who will likely be chosen from the youth debate group.

## Children's theater show big hit on Monday evening

**ORANJESTAD – On St. Eustatius, the population is busy preparing for the celebration of Statia Day next Wednesday, November 16.**

The theater show for children, Show your Talent, which was executed on Monday, was a big hit with both the young performers and the public. Monday's show was partly sponsored by UNICEF The Netherlands.

In 2023, many projects will be carried out in collaboration with UNICEF. Positive parenting will be tackled together with St. Maarten. St. Eustatius will also work on further strengthening youth participation by opening the parenting shop, where parents, teachers, and everyone involved with children's upbringing will be able to go to understand and address parenting issues.



# ST. MAARTEN

On St. Maarten, the diagnostic assessment phase of the Positive Parenting program has been completed. After conducting interviews with parents and stakeholders, it was decided to focus on community participation. There was good turnout at subsequent group sessions with parents and children, and agendas and activities were designed based on the themes that emerged from consultations.

The Positive Parenting Support Programme (PPSP) training for facilitators took place after the diagnostic assessment and involved 52 certified PPSP professionals from the government and foundations. The facilitators reviewed a handbook that was developed for the implementation of Positive Parenting.

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## 52 newly certified as facilitators of new parenting programme

PHILIPSBURG-The Ministry of Education, Culture, Youth and Sport (ECYS) and UNICEF the Netherlands celebrate a key milestone in their partnership, 52 facilitators newly trained on positive parenting.

The training is part of the new Positive Parenting Support Programme (PPSP), UNICEF the Netherlands (UNICEF NL) said in a press release on Thursday.

A parenting programme tailor-made for St. Maarten has been a long-term goal and initiative led by the Department of Youth and implemented with technical support from UNICEF NL.

Minister of ECYS Rodolphe Samuel commended the new facilitators for their hard work, and the Department of Youth and UNICEF the Netherlands for continuing to strengthen the capacity of professionals working with children and their families.

This training programme and the overall positive parenting support programme represent a significant investment in strengthening St. Maarten's family support systems and the island's achievement of its sustainable development goals, stated Dr. Henry Charles, Senior Programme Specialist, UNICEF

NL. Over the past four months, educators, social workers, policymakers, and child protection professionals, have attended the PPSP training to become certified PPSP facilitators. The PPSP facilitators will assist in providing positive parenting support classes to the wider community.

"When parents come to us for support, they are dealing with a lot – so much that advice or a referral might not be enough to change their attitude or behaviour. The Positive Parenting Support Programme teaches us creative ways to engage parents," shared Social Worker Tjashana Honore who received her certificate along with the other 51 new PPSP Facilitators.

According to the release, the curriculum for the PPSP was developed through extensive research and data collected from dozens of focus group discussions and stakeholder interviews by a collaborative team from The University of the West Indies Open Campus, through the Caribbean Child Development Centre (CCDC), in partnership with Parenting Partners Caribbean (PPC). Research emphasised the needs of the St.

Maarten community and its multicultural society.

Ceceile Minott and Linda Craigie-Brown are part of the large team of experts who contributed to the development of the PPSP. Parents, children, and youth were consulted in the research phase of the development of the PPSP. Interestingly, all parties voiced many of the same concerns.

Some of their shared opinions included; not having sufficient activities for children and youth, not having access to information about parenting, and wanting to have a more open and trusting relationship with their family.

Minott said in addition, finances remain a worry of families in St. Maarten. "Parents are unsure how to balance the high cost of living, working multiple jobs, and still having time for their children."

However, the PPSP principles affirmed that it is not about the quantity of time a parent spends with their children; but the quality. "A parent can be home all day with their child, but have made no effort to connect or support them. On the other hand, a parent can also spend an hour with their child and actively build their relation-

ship with them," explained Craigie-Brown. The classes will teach parents positive approaches to communicating, disciplining, and building a better connection with their children.

Positive parenting, or just parenting, has many different descriptions embodying the meaning and responsibilities of a parent, the release explained. But what it comes down to, according to the experts, is encouraging the parent to see and positively treat their children. "Words stick, hurt, describe and prescribe. If we tell a child that they are worthless and good for nothing – this is what they will believe and act accordingly,"

conclude Minott and Craigie-Brown.

As the next step, 20 PPSP facilitators have been selected to continue their training and become "Master Trainers". Master Trainers can train others to become PPSP facilitators, ensuring the continuity and accessibility of parenting sessions on St. Maarten.

Providing more accessible parenting classes also plays a large part in protecting children: "This is why developing this Positive Parenting Support Programme has been a priority for the Department of Youth and our Ministry. I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to all who spent their time and efforts

attending the classes and getting certified. Through your knowledge and commitment, we can provide more accessible parenting classes to our community," expressed Soraya Agard-Lake, Head of the Department of Youth.

The PPSP is part of the Child Resilience and Protection Project (CRPP), financed by the government of the Netherlands, through the St. Maarten Trust Fund, administered by the World Bank. In addition to these facilitators, 18 professionals participated in a training of trainers session in March. The next phase will focus on the development of a Parenting Vision, which, among other things, will aid in deciding the date for the next parenting week. The development of a COMBI Plan for Positive Parenting will start in May.

A draft of the National Platform Child Protection Sint Maarten is being reviewed as part of the wide-ranging efforts to combat child abuse. The platform consists of a steering group and an implementation working group, which will be advised by the Youth Sounding Board comprising young people aged 15 to 24.



In 2022 St. Maarten organized MY Participation Matters, a round table discussion by young people. This has led to the creation of additional youth-led activities with organizations such as Leo's and Youth Parliament. About 350 young people participated in the discussions spearheaded by MY Participation Matters and the Youth Parliament Panel on themes ranging from mental balance, and empowering leaders, to youth participation. Furthermore, a strategic communication plan (behavioral change COMBI plan) for youth participation was developed as well as an awareness campaign (MY Participation Matters), and a spoken-word video. A Concept Note Youth Participation Initiative (JPI) was also drawn up. JPI is a package of training courses for professionals regarding effective youth participation, which will take place in the 3rd quarter.

In the coming years, the recommendations for funding models for early childhood development and after-school programs will be implemented to fulfill the Safety Nets and Minimum Standards for Childcare policies. To ensure this is accomplished, stakeholders have received training on how to raise funds more effectively.

The initial assessment phase for a Violence Prevention framework has been completed. It includes a violence prevention policy and a strategic action plan outlining the objectives, core values, key priorities, and evidence-based interventions needed to reduce violence in schools in Sint Maarten. Stakeholders met and discussed the framework's findings and aims, and representatives from several organizations received training on the implementation of key strategies. The Policy Brief Situation and Causal Analysis and the Action Plan for the framework are now being finalized.
